

## Rheumatic Fever Report

## July 2017 to June 2018

This report provides an overview of rheumatic fever in New Zealand in 2017/18 using both notification data from EpiSurv and hospitalisation data from the National Minimum Dataset (NMDS). The information presented is based on data recorded on EpiSurv as at 12 October 2018 and on the NMDS as at 5 September 2018.

Notifications for initial episodes of rheumatic fever with an onset date between 1 July 2017 and 30 June 2018 were linked with first episode rheumatic fever hospitalisations (as defined by the <a href="Better Public Services">Better Public Services (BPS) rheumatic fever target</a>) with a discharge date between 1 July 2017 and 30 June 2018. Cases that did not match were followed up to see whether they met the case definition for rheumatic fever (as per the <a href="Communicable Disease Control Manual">Communicable Disease Control Manual</a>). Those that did not meet the definition were excluded.

Once the hospitalisation and notification data were matched, there were 156 cases that met the definition of first episode rheumatic fever between 1 July 2017 and 30 June 2018, giving a rate of 3.3 per 100,000 population. This number includes cases that were not hospitalised, cases that had another diagnosis whilst in hospital but were later diagnosed with rheumatic fever, and cases that were notified in 2017/18 but discharged from hospital after 1 July 2018. Cases that were diagnosed with rheumatic fever whilst in hospital but later found not to meet the case definition for rheumatic fever are not included in this number.

Table 1 shows the number and incidence rate per 100,000 population for first episode rheumatic fever cases by age group and ethnic group in 2017/18.

Note: For categories with ≤10 cases rates are considered unstable and should be interpreted with caution. Rates have not been calculated where there were fewer than four cases in a category.

The Rheumatic Fever Prevention Programme ran from 2011 to 30 June 2017 and included the provision of free sore throat services in the community and in primary schools in high incidence areas, targeting 4–19 year olds and 5–12 year olds respectively. Table 2 shows the number and incidence rate per 100,000 population for first episode rheumatic fever for these age groups by ethnic group for 2017/18.



Figure 1 shows the geographical distribution of first episode rheumatic fever cases for July 2017 to June 2018.

For DHBs with ≤10 cases rates are considered unstable and should be interpreted with caution.

Figure 2. First episode rheumatic fever hospital discharge rates, 2002/03–2017/18




Figure 3. First episode rheumatic fever hospital discharge rates for Māori and Pacific peoples, 2011/12–2017/18
